NOTE FROM THE PASTOR



As I was sitting down to write this Pastor's Note, I wondered what ChatGPT might say about Lent. I asked the bot for an idea for an inspirational story about Lent and our editor,

Devon, wrote the tale. Here's the story:

Once upon a time, a humble baker named Elias lived in a small village nestled in a land of rolling hills. Elias was the sort of person who kept to himself, more or less dedicated to his work of baking the bread that all the villagers used in their daily lives and routines: Morning loaves, dinner loaves, sweet loaves, pastries for special occasions, even cakes. You could say he was famous in the village for his delicious breads, which he made with love and dedication every morning before sunrise.

Winter lay upon the village in gentle sheets of white, fluffy snow, but the days were starting to lengthen. The village was preparing for the season of Lent, an important time in the lives of the villagers. Life might have gone on as it usually did, but as Elias woke early, night still upon the village, on Ash Wednesday morning to prepare the loaves for the day, he felt a kind of restlessness, a stirring. As he began to make the dough, he wondered if there was something more he could be doing, something more than just making and selling his loaves and pastries.

As he kneaded the dough, he thought of every person and family in the village in turn. The village was small, and everyone knew everyone, so it wasn't a great challenge. There was the miller's family, which was rather large, so they bought lots of bread. There was the local physician who was married to the midwife. Their

family was small but once a week they bought a special pastry for their children. He thought of the stonemason, the blacksmith, and the builders. He thought of the priest and the anchoress who resided in a secluded cell in the church. He didn't know her, of course, but he knew the priest provided well for her.

Then Elias thought of the farmers. He knew some of the families had struggled this winter. He suddenly recalled that he hadn't seen anyone from one farmer's family for weeks now. It occurred to him that they might not have the means to buy bread, and that they had been subsisting on whatever they had to hand.

At that realization, Elias knew what he could do.

Elias kept his regular routine: Rising early, making the bread, selling it at the morning market. But he made one important change, the change that satisfied the restless feeling he'd had that Ash Wednesday morning. He set aside a basket of bread and, after the closing of the market, took the fresh loaves—some still warm from the oven—to the farmhouses. The farmers were surprised to see him, and even more surprised when he gave each of them loaves free of charge. He gave no explanation, only smiled, bid them good day, and returned to the bakery.

Each morning after was the same. Elias rose, made his wares, and set aside a basket that he would bring to the farmers. He spent time with them, learned about their lives and struggles. On Sundays he would bring the children pastries to enjoy after church service.

He didn't reserve his kindness, but shared it with others as well. When the blacksmith's wife got sick and couldn't rouse herself from bed, Elias brought bread and some supplies without asking for anything in return. When anyone in the village needed help or something extra to get them through the day, Elias would be there.

And his kindness didn't go unnoticed. It was a small village, and within the first couple days of Lent, everyone was talking about it: Elias, who nobody knew very well, was giving what he had to help others. Some of the villagers grew concerned that perhaps Elias, in his spirit of giving, was giving too much, and that he might start to struggle despite the kindness and love he showed his neighbors. A few of them approached Elias with their concerns, but he simply nodded with a smile, thanked them for their concern, and continued with his plan.

Not everyone completely understood this seemingly sudden burst of generosity, but all were touched by it in some way. That's how the spirit grew. Those that were concerned for Elias' well being started to help him in small but meaningful ways: Making small repairs, delivering firewood or other goods he might need, helping deliver bread around the village. By Palm Sunday, the villagers seemed closer to one another than they had before, for they weren't only helping Elias, but all their neighbors as well.

Elias was at his work again, as always, on Easter morning, but this morning felt different. It felt like a new beginning and he was sure that the seeds that had been planted during Lent would sprout and grow and flourish throughout the year and ever after. He remembered an old poet had once said: "No man is an island." How true that was, Elias thought. It seemed to him that there was no greater strength than love.

I like that! And I know, as well as all of you do, that sometimes life isn't easy. Sometimes it's extremely difficult.

The journey you and I are on is a profound one. It's a time of spiritual renewal, a

period of introspection, and a chance for profound growth in our relationship with

Catherine Doherty says this about Lent: "Lent is a time of going very deeply into ourselves... What is it that stands between us and God? Between us and our siblings? Between us and life, the life of the Spirit? Whatever it is, let us relentlessly tear it out, without a moment's hesitation."

This Lent there are opportunities at Heart • of Longmont to grow in your faith:

 Join me in reading the Gospel of Mark, the first and shortest gospel, to . learn more about the life of Jesus and explore through the gospel how your faith can grow and change. There is a formal study time, but you can also

- do a daily reading on your own. Join in one of the small group opportunities for study and discussion.
- Consider a time of fasting.
- Consider a focus on prayer. Try to recite the Lord's prayer three times a day or maybe sit in quiet, prayerful contemplation during the day.
- Volunteer your time in one of our many ministries to those in our community who are in need.
- Take time to reflect on your life, examining your life and repenting of any wrongdoing.
- Simplify your life! Lent is a good time to focus on simplicity and detachment from "worldly distractions". Consider simplifying your schedule, decluttering your

living space, or reducing your consumption of material goods. This can help create space for spiritual growth and contemplation.

Remember that the purpose of Lent is not just to give something up for the sake of sacrifice, but to draw closer to God, grow in faith, and prepare spiritually for the celebration of Easter. Choose practices that resonate with you personally and help you to deepen your relationship with God.

In the spirit of the Wesleyan tradition, may you find your heart strangely warmed throughout this season as we make our way to our defining story of Easter.

Avery - 7th Grade



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
Delilah - 7th Grade


Adrian - 8th Grade

THE JOYS OF READING

Last summer, Hilary King, of the Wild Plum Center (Head Start) program housed in our education wing during the week, shared that with the new laws going into effect for Universal Preschool that the Wild Plum Center would have their kiddos five days a week from 8 AM to 4 PM. She wondered if our church was interested in having "Library Time", as we were in the midst of re-purposing the room at the time to use as a condensed Library/Indoor Learning Center.

An idea for a reading program was hatched and implemented with the help of volunteers from our congregation and the program has been going strong since the beginning of the school year in August. Readers come in on Wednesdays and either read to the 1- and 2-year-olds and 3- and 4-year-old classes in the Library or they go the infant room and read to

that class. On Fridays (and some Thursdays), the Pre-K kids come in two classes for a half hour segment each to have stories read to them, then they check out a book to take home with them for the week. This helps those students prepare for public school next year and the responsibilities of library books.

The readers have bonded with the children and the classes are so excited to come to the Library/Indoor Learning Center room, sit on a carpet and be read to. We recently had a donation of 51 "big" books to our program and they are loved by readers and children alike! We have a wonderful partnership with our Wild Plum program who service 56 children on a daily basis.

Renovations began the week after Thanksgiving and hit the ground running. The most obvious is the new main projector screen that measures at 189"! A big upgrade from the 75" TV. The Big Guy has been with us since November and along with it came ProPresenter, our new software that runs all the displays in the sanctuary, as well as our livestream. The Chapel, Nursery, and Library now have displays that are wired to watch the service as it's happening. This is big for Nursery and Children's Ministry staff who may want to tune in on Sunday, and we hope to utilize this functionality in the Chapel for memorial services. Speaking of the Library, the new display is a Smartboard for Wild Plum's use. It has been a blast getting to play with this new toy! I'm so excited that the Wild Plum staff now have a tool like this. Who knew a whiteboard with circuits could be so fun?

On the audio side, we have new speakers hung in the sanctuary! I am stoked about how they sound, and hope you all have heard the difference in clarity. While getting new gear so close to the Christmas Cantata was nerve-wracking, I am so happy I got to debut eight new microphones that way! That weekend was so fun, and I'm blessed to have a job that pays me to listen to such talented musicians. On our less busy Sundays, you can see the new microphones in front of the choir or bell choir. There's a new one hidden in the piano, too! Claire and Tricia also got new wireless microphones, which I think sound great.

The longest part of this overhaul was a major upgrade to our livestream! I redesigned our livestream setup from scratch, and on January 21, my team and I debuted a brand new look for our online viewers. If you haven't checked out a stream in a while, I encourage you to watch one the next time you aren't in worship. The biggest change is that we can now overlay lyrics, quotes, or whatever is on the projector screen on top of the cameras' video feeds, so viewers can see what's happening in the room! That might seem like a small detail, but it has truly changed the experience online.

I have learned a ton throughout this process, and know I will be learning more as I refine the details. A huge thank you to Marlen, who funded this project! None of this could have happened without his support. I am also incredibly grateful for those of you who saw me at the church at all sorts of odd hours and offered encouragement, while also making sure I was getting my rest! PUTTING MORE OF GOD'S LOVE INTO THE WORLD WITH WATER FILTERS AND SMOKELESS STOVES

On February 23, a group of volunteers from Heart of Longmont traveled to Guatemala on a special mission working with ODIM-Guatemala.

Who are ODIM? They are the Organization for the Development of the Indigenous Maya (ODIM), a non-profit organization that works with the people of San Pablo La Laguna and San Juan la Laguna on issues of healthcare and preventative health care and education. They approach their work with a spirit of equality and honesty and work to empower local communities and people.

ODIM originally formed in the wake of Hurricane Stan in 2005 when a group of foreign residents of Lake Atitlán came together to provide humanitarian assistance to the communities and people devastated by the storm. Since that time, ODIM has grown and provides primary health care and health education programs in the rural communities





around Lake Atitlán with the help of many volunteers and the support of many churches, organizations, and individuals.

Heart of Longmont's volunteers are another piece of this important work. The group of volunteers are providing smokeless stoves and water filters for homes in the local community there. Both measures are essential to the health of people of all ages. Water filters ensure water is safe to drink and

use, and the smokeless stoves reduce the risk of respiratory illness and injury while still providing warmth and cooking surfaces.

Our Heart of Longmont volunteers will not only be putting more of God's love into the world this way, but will be learning about the local peoples and their communities. It is of greatest importance that organizations and volunteer groups be respectful of the people and culture of the communities they want to help and take steps to listen to, understand, and respect their needs. ODIM, in their work, understands how important this is.

2023 FINANCIAL UPDATE

I am pleased to present our financial update for the year 2023.

In terms of financial matters, 2023 was a tremendous success. Initially budgeted with a deficit of approximately \$60,000, primarily reflecting investments in ministry and mission, we achieved nearly break-even status for the year. This accomplishment speaks volumes about the dedication of our faithful community and affirms that our investments are yielding dividends not only in monetary terms but also in the meaningful impact of our ministry and mission endeavors.

Financially, we closed the year on a strong note. Our income for the year exceeded that of 2022 by 19%, driven by significant additional contributions from longtime members. generous giving from new members, nonpledge income attributed to increased worship attendance, and the receipt of a \$40,000 legacy gift from a former member.

While our expenses experienced a 10.8% increase compared to 2022, our year-to-date

Heart of Longmont has been blessed for years by the amazing, ongoing support and generosity of our members. The Mission Design team allocated portions of their funds for two key initiatives: Celebrating our 10-year anniversary as a reconciling congregation (which we are celebrating this year) and establishing a new missional relationship with Recovery Café.

Through these projects, we hope to



On February 1, the revised Wesley Townhomes Minor Subdivision Plat and Site Plan were 8, the City indicated the submission was acceptable for review and that comments will be available March 11. It's worth noting that Fundraising and Financing we are confident in our progress and believe having the site plan approved.

Timeline Overview

Assuming minimal additional comments from the City, it is conceivable that the site plan could be approved by May 1.

We are planning to host a groundbreaking ceremony between the submission of the building permit request and the end of summer. This will be a momentous occasion and a cause for celebration.

It takes teamwork to make the dream work and our dream is "Put More of God's Love into the World"!






"Being Transgender is hard, and if I can help even one person on that journey, and teach others what it means to be transgender, then my soul is happy."

The Faith and Reason Adult Ministry Class will be using Adam Hamilton's video series *Final Words From The Cross*.






