Greetings Heart of Longmont Family,

October is my favorite month of the year. There's something about the crisp air, the blaze of red and

gold leaves, the bright orange pumpkins on doorsteps, and the return of cozy sweaters and jackets that fills my heart with joy and gratitude. October is a month that invites us to savor beauty and give thanks for God's faithfulness through the changing seasons.

As I reflect on this past season in the life of our church, I'm filled with gratitude for the powerful conversations and heartfelt reflections so many of you shared during our recent worship series on courage and Mariann Edgar Budde's book How We Learn to Be Brave. Your willingness to wrestle with hard questions, name your fears, and to practice courageous faith has been inspirational to witness. I want you to know what a gift you are to me and to this community. Thank you for living out your faith each and every day.

I want to say a heartfelt thank you for the extraordinary generosity you've shown through our Heart of Community capital campaign earlier this year. That campaign was dedicated solely to repairing our church building, roof, and parking lot so we can serve the community for years to come. Your continued gifts toward that effort are deeply appreciated.

At the same time, I'm so grateful for the generosity of tithes and offerings that allows the daily ministry of our church to occur. Our collective giving provides our staff their salaries, fuels operational costs, and allows for transformational ministry to happen. As we plan for our 2026 ministry budget, we need everyone's generosity to sustain and grow the vital work of this congregation.

Starting October 12, we'll be beginning a new worship series called *Our Money Story*, created by the leaders at A Sanctified Art. Over four Sundays, we'll reflect on how God invites us to live lives rooted in generosity. We'll explore how Scripture tells many different money stories. We'll unpack the story of manna in the wilderness, the generosity of the disciples in the early church, and celebrate how people trusted God enough to share what they had for the good of all.

Together, we'll ask:

What have we been taught about

 What have we been taught about money (explicitly or implicitly), and how does that shape the way we live

- and give today?
- What stories of fear or scarcity might God be calling us to release?
- What stories of trust, generosity, and abundance is God inviting us to embrace?

This is not simply about numbers or budgets. It's about our hearts, our values, and our discipleship. It's about allowing God's grace to reshape the way we see and use our resources so giving becomes an expression of love, gratitude, and hope for what God can do through us.

I'm very grateful for Haleigh Bird, who has created a beautiful series of video interviews that we will share each week during this worship series. These videos feature voices from our congregation sharing how Heart of Longmont has impacted their lives. I know these stories will inspire and encourage us as we reflect on our own journeys of generosity and faith.

I hope you'll join us for this meaningful season. My prayer is that this October will be full of reflection and renewal. May we soak in the beauty of this season and give thanks to the many ways the Lord continues to bless us.


STARTING SUNDAY, OCTOBER 12

HEART OF COMMUNITY MILESTONE UPDATE

We did it! Thanks to your incredible generosity, our Heart of Community Capital Campaign has surpassed its \$1 million goal. We've received commitments totaling \$1,163,055 from 87 family units—and an amazing \$362,633 has already been given in just three months. That's over 30% of total commitments, well above the 15–20% typically received early in most campaigns. Thank you for believing in the future of our church!

On the strength of this early support, we've already completed our first priority: repairing air conditioning in the Office, Chapel, and Education Wing.

Even more good news: in September, commitments increased by \$100,000, allowing us to pay off our debt. This strengthens our financial foundation and frees resources for ministry for years to

The parking lot project, originally planned for this fall, will now be completed

in spring 2026. This timing ensures we do the work at the right season with clarity on scope and costs for long-lasting results.

Meanwhile, we're working with architects and designers to envision updates to our church's interior spaces and exterior face. These enhancements are about more than appearance—they're about creating welcoming, flexible spaces for mission and ministry. Join us on October 11 to see preliminary design renderings and share your input. Based on costs and scheduling, interior updates are likely to begin mid-2026.

Other priorities, such as the Gallery roof, remain dependent on project timelines and costs. We will arrange an inspection this fall and take steps to mitigate leaks through the winter and spring.

As always, we remain committed to transparency, thoughtful planning, and good stewardship. Together, we are building a foundation for the next generation of ministry at Heart of Longmont.

VETERANS DAY GUN SAFE GIVEAWAY

November 11th is not just a holiday, it is a sacred moment to honor the men and women who have stood in harm's way for our freedom. They have carried the weight of battle, sacrificed deeply, and returned home with scars, both seen and unseen.

Yet today, far too many of our veterans are fighting another battle—one against despair. The truth is sobering: more than half of U.S. gun deaths are suicides, and gun suicide. Since 2003, over 87,000 veterans have died this way. Every day, 13 veterans take their own lives with a firearm. These are

not just statistics—they are fathers, mothers, Walk in the parade. Help us hand out safes. children, neighbors, heroes.

But we can make a difference. By encouraging responsible gun ownership and placing even a few moments of time and space between a moment of crisis and a firearm, we can save lives.

That's why Heart of Longmont, together with the United Church of Christ, will be in Roosevelt Park after the Veterans veterans are three times more likely to die by Day parade, giving away free handgun safes and locks. This is an act of love, of gratitude, and of hope.

We are calling on you to join us.

Show our veterans that their lives matter, that their sacrifice is honored, and that their future is worth protecting.

This is your chance to say thank you with more than words—this is your chance to help save a life.

Defending LGBTQ+ Rights for Coloradans, at Home and in D.C. by Mardi Moore (she)

What happens in Washington, D.C. doesn't stay in Washington. It directly impacts LGBTQ+ people here in Colorado, and that's why RMEQ has been hard at work this year fighting back against harmful federal policies and making sure our community's voices are represented, even outside of Colorado.

Next week, along with RMEQ COO Dr. Bruce Parker, and Neil Fishman, president of the Rocky Mountain Equality Action Fund board, I will meet with lawmakers and partners in D.C. to make sure Colorado's LGBTQ+ community is heard loud and clear.

This work is about all of us, and together, we're building a future where every LGBTQ+ person in Colorado can live authentically and thrive.

What We've Accomplished So Far

RMEQ's federal policy work has focused on a few big things: protecting access to healthcare for trans youth and adults, fighting for LGBTQ+ people to be represented in federal data, defending students' rights in schools, protecting our marriages, securing accurate gender markers on identity documents, and advocating for funding for programs that keep our community safe and healthy.

And we've already made important progress. From protecting trans students by helping stop a proposed federal ban on

transgender youth in school sports to fighting back against harmful rules that target gender-affirming care, passports, and LGBTQ+ affirming schools.

We are committed to keeping up the fight and making sure our community is well informed about challenges to our rights and changes in federal policy.

How We're Fighting Back Right Now

We know these attacks aren't slowing down, so neither are we. Right now, RMEQ is:

- Teaming up with more than 80 organizations to oppose federal rollbacks of equal opportunity protections.
- Defending Colorado's ban on conversion therapy that is being challenged in a U.S. Supreme Court case.
- Supporting Colorado laws that replace healthcare funding lost due to federal cuts.
- Working with local hospitals and agencies to make sure anti-LGBTQ+ orders from Washington don't go unchallenged here in Colorado.

Looking Ahead

There's still so much work to do. In the months ahead, we'll keep pushing Congress to fully fund essential services, tracking court cases that could rollback LGBTQ+ rights, keeping our community updated on policy changes, and fighting back against every attempt to strip away our protections.





HOL Cares About Your Health

This is a precarious time for public health, and especially for our friends and neighbors who are immunocompromised, disabled, or otherwise at risk.
